don't like to make resolutions, but I do make lists and set goals and challenges for myself. I don't sew with scraps, but I do have lots of "leftovers". Scraps are little bits and pieces; leftovers are the bigger pieces left from those "I love it and bought more that I needed" fabrics.

The leftovers selected for this design include those "reads as solids" that are not enough for another full-size project but represent the color palette reflected in past projects. They are taking up space that I need for the new collections calling my name. Hourglass blocks are a reminder that the time is now to make use of leftovers. Border boxes represent the check off boxes for New Year tasks to be completed. Limiting the color palette to variations of the six tertiary colors still gives a scrappy look without the busy-ness of prints. Bonus outcome: more confidence in using all solids in a project. Like a scrappy quilt, the "leftovers quilt" also allows for reminiscing on projects from the past.

Plan

This quilt pattern is the perfect way to use up leftover fabrics, but it is graphic enough to inspire a shopping trip to your local quilt shop too!

Use an accurate ¼" seam allowance throughout to ensure all elements of the quilt fit together well.

Handle all bias edges carefully to avoid distortion.

Shop

Fabric yardage assumes 40" usable width of fabric (WOF) unless otherwise noted.

- Light gray tonal
 ³/₈ yd. for blocks, units, and border
- Burgundy tonal 1 yd. for blocks, units, border, and binding
- White tonal 1¹/₈ yds. for blocks and border
- Medium gray tonal ³/₈ yd. for blocks, units, and border
- Turquoise tonal ³/₈ yd. for blocks, units, and border
- Gold tonal
 ³/₈ yd. for blocks, units, and border
- Dark teal tonal ³/₈ yd. for blocks, units, and border
- Assorted tonals
 ³/₄ yd. *total* for units and border
- Dark gray tonal ½ yd. for blocks, units, and border
- Backing
 3 yds.
- Batting 49" x 68"

Cut

Patches are lettered in order of use. Measurements include ¼" seam allowances.

 \square = cut in half once diagonally \square = cut in half twice diagonally

- Light gray tonal 1 square 11¹/₄" cut ⊠ to make 4 triangles (A) (2 are extra) 2 squares 4" (C) 8 rectangles 3" x 5¹/₂" (B)
- Burgundy tonal 6 strips 2¹/₂" x WOF for binding 1 square 11¹/₄" cut ⊠ to make 4 triangles (A) (2 are extra) 5 squares 4" (C) 6 rectangles 3" x 5¹/₂" (B)
- White tonal 3 squares 11¼" cut ⊠ to make 12 triangles (A)
 17 squares 6¼" cut ⊠ to make 68 triangles (D)
 8 square 4⅛" cut ⊠ to make 16 triangles (E)
- Medium gray tonal 1 square 11¹/₄" cut ⊠ to make 4 triangles (A) (2 are extra) 3 squares 4" (C) 7 rectangles 3" x 5¹/₂" (B)
- Turquoise tonal 1 square 11¹/₄" cut ⊠ to make 4 triangles (A) (2 are extra) 2 squares 4" (C) 2 rectangles 3" x 5¹/₂" (B)
- Gold tonal
 l square 11¹/₄" cut ⊠ to make
 4 triangles (A) (2 are extra)
 5 squares 4" (C)
 5 rectangles 3" x 5¹/₂" (B)



- Dark teal tonal
 1 square 11¹/₄" cut ⊠ to make
 4 triangles (A) (2 are extra)
 6 squares 4" (C)
 7 rectangles 3" x 5¹/₂" (B)
- Assorted tonals cut a total of: 11 squares 4" (C) 33 rectangles 3" x 5¹/₂" (B)
- Dark gray tonal 12 squares 5½" (F) 4 squares 4" (C)



Sew


1. Referring to Diagram I-A, join 2 white tonal A's, 1 light gray tonal A, and 1 burgundy tonal A as shown to make block U.




Make 1

Diagram I-A

In the same manner and referring to Diagram I-B, make 1 each of blocks V-Z in the colors shown.



2. Using an assortment of tonals, join 4 B's as shown to make a unit. Make 17 unit's total.




Unit Make 17 total

Diagram II





 Sew together 10 assorted tonal C's, 18 white tonal D's, and 4 white tonal E's as shown in Diagram II-A to make a side border. Make 2 side borders total. Trim E's as shown in Trimming Diagram. In same way, join 9 assorted C's, 16 white D's, and 4 white tonal E's as shown in **Diagram II-B**, and trimming E's to make a top/bottom border. Make 2 top/bottom borders total.



NOTE: Refer to **Assembly Diagram** for following steps, watching block placement and orientation.

4. Sew 4 rows of

3 dark gray tonal F's and 2 units as shown. Join 1 block U, 1 block V, and


3 units as shown. Sew 3 units,

1 block U and 1 block V as shown. Join 3 units, 1 block W, and 1 block X as shown. Join 3 units, 1 block Y, and 1 block Z as shown. Join rows together as shown.

5. Matching centers and ends, sew border side strips to quilt.

Repeat to add border top and bottom strips.

 Layer, baste, and quilt. Stacie alternated machine quilted flowers and straight lines in the triangles. Bind the quilt.





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Stacie's custom quilting truly makes this quilt pattern sing. But what if you are somewhat new to quilting or just are a bit intimidated? Fear not, we have some design inspiration for you.

On the left, this simple allover loop pattern is quick and easy to accomplish even if you are a free motion quilting newbie! Bonus, this pattern will be soft and

snuggly after washing.

Below, this slightly more complicated design is easy once you learn a few tricks. This design uses the patches in the quilt as a jumping off point. Simply create arcs around and within each patch to create a simple design that gives that custom quilted look that is easy even for beginners.
